#### DESCRIPTION

From the 1922 silent film *Hungry Hearts* through the first "talkie," *The Jazz Singer*, produced in 1927, and beyond *Schindler's List* (1993), Jewish characters have confronted the problems of their Jewishness on the silver screen for a general American audience. Alongside this Hollywood tradition of Jewish film, Yiddish film blossomed from independent producers between 1911 and 1939, and interpreted literary masterpieces, from Shakespeare's *King Lear* to Sholem Aleichem's *Tevye the Dairyman* and Sholem Asch's *Uncle Moses* primarily for an immigrant, urban, Jewish audience.

In this course, we will study a number of films and their literary sources (in fiction and drama), focusing on English-language and Yiddish films within the framework of three problems of interpretation: a) the different ways we "read" literature and film; b) the various ways that the media of fiction, drama, and film "translate" Jewish culture; and c) how these translations of Jewish culture affect and are affected by their implied audience.
