## The University of Florida History of the Holocaust EUH 3030/JST 3931 Spring 2015

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This class provides an analysis of the greatest premeditated atrocity in Western history – the murder of nearly six million European Jews from 1939-1945. It will approach this event chronologically and geographically but also from a variety of perspectives --from that of the killers, from that of the victims, and from that of the bystanders. We will also examine major historical arguments concerning the Holocaust's most crucial aspects. Students will attain a factual command of the major developments of the Holocaust within the context of Jewish, European, and World History and gain an introductory knowledge of differing historiographical and social scientific explanations.

There is substantial reading, speaking and writing in this class. I insist on commitment from you. It will be worth your while. Your grade will be determined as follows:

## Discussions and Response Papers -- 40% in aggregate.

There are fourteen open discussion days in this course, all on Thursdays. For eleven of them you will have to read the week's assignments in advance and you will have to write a **300-500 word** (typed, double-spaced) response to a question given to you the previous week. Your grade will be determined by the quality of your response papers (namely the degree to which they are polished **while actively engaging the readings**) and the degree to which you **participate** in live discussion. Response papers must be submitted to Canvas **before** your discussion section. Late response papers will not be accepted. An unexcused absence from discussion with or without a response paper will result in zero for that discussion. I will drop the lowest weekly Discussion/Response grade, so use it wisely.

#### Midterm Examination -- 30%.

The Midterm Exam is on February 12, from 6-8 PM, room TBA. It cannot be made up save for extreme circumstances. The exam will be made up of identification questions and essays. Possible essay questions will be distributed ten days in advance.

#### Final Examination -- 30%.

The Final Exam is on April 30 from 5:30-7:30 pm. It cannot be made up save for extreme circumstances. The exam will be made up of identification questions and essays. Possible essay questions will be distributed ten days in advance.
