Class Description

This course will examine through the medium of film Israel's struggle for national identity since its founding as a modern state. Topics include the challenges presented to the creation of a national identity by ethnically diverse immigration, the secular/religious divide and the Arab-Israeli conflict. These challenges will be explored across three broadly-defined periods of Israeli cinematic expression: a) nationalistic propaganda; b) apocalyptic visions and national disintegration; and c) renewed exploration of national values. Each week during the quarter, students will view a film pertaining to a particular struggle for national identity from one of these three periods of Israeli cinema and read materials to help place the film in an appropriate socio-historical context.

Course Requirements

Students are expected to attend class having read the assigned materials and prepared to participate in class discussions. Students who miss three or more classes during the

quarter will be penalized on their final grade, and excessive absences will be noted on narrative evaluations.

Written assignments are due at the beginning of class on the date indicated in the class schedule (below). Late work will receive partial credit. Written assignments include:

- Weekly 1 2 page movie analysis, which will focus on the following questions:
 - 1. What socio-historical reality is the film portraying? (use readings, lectures)
 - 2. What attitudes about national identity are reflected in the film?
 - 3. How does the filmmaker convey these attitudes cinematically?
- Final paper (5 7 pages)

The final grade has the following components:

- Movie analyses 50%
- Final paper 35%
- Class participation 15%
