Background:

Some might say the goal of both sociology and Catholic social teaching is bringing about a peaceful and just world. One may recall Paul VI's words, "if you want peace, work for justice." Given that, our approach will be to highlight the roots and causes of conflict and miscarriages of justice in our social world today, paying special attention to the conflicts and peace movements since World War II.

Course Goals and Learning Objectives:

In this broad conception of "peace and justice", we will "think globally," looking at injustices as the source of conflict. In our first unit we will examine theories that define causes of violence and conflict. In the second part of the semester, we will address particular cases of conflict and reconciliation across the globe. The final unit explores frameworks for conflict reconciliation and transformation with an emphasis placed on building positive peace; that is *peace with justice*.

#### Media:

I will use a number of media forms in this class. Social movements aimed at bringing about justice take inspiration from anthems and images, reaching into the deeper layers of the psyche to muster action and resistance. Given that, I hope to engage the emotional dimensions of different cases by playing music and films that convey the collective and narrative dimensions of conflict, violence, and peace processes. I hope you appreciate these images and songs and gain a deeper insight into the experiences of those far away, and near.

Paper Assignments (Reviews and Essay): DUE IN BLACKBOARD WHEN NOTED. ALL LATE PAPERS, REGARDLESS OF CIRCUMSTANCES, WILL BE PENALIZED WITH POINT DEDUCTIONS, AS NOTED IN THE INDIVIDUAL ESSAY RUBRICS. Promptness, accountability, and meeting deadlines are important life-skills to cultivate.

- Midterm Paper: Film Review: Using the theories addressed in Unit 1 or other material, write a film review of one of the films we watch in class or other film with permission from the professor. Other films to suggest: *Gandhi* (South Africa, India-Pakistan), *Fahrenheit 911* (War on Terror, Domestic conflict and upheaval), *Bloody Sunday* (Ireland), *Munich* (Middle East/Israel-Palestine), *Divine Intervention* (Middle East/Israel-Palestine), *Motorcycle Diaries* (South America), *Romero* (South America), *Indochine* (Vietnam), *Fog of War* (Cold War/Vietnam), *Welcome to Sarajevo* (Bosnia), *Sometimes in April* (Rwanda)...there are many, many more—check with the professor. - Literature Review—Case Study of Conflict or Peace Process (Unit 2): Choose one nation or case study of a peace process from Unit 2. You will be required to select one conflict/peace process and write an organized literature summarizing at least four (4) academic (peer reviewed) articles or book chapters on the case of your choosing. After summarizing the articles you must make a projection or outline key issues, which remain unresolved if the conflict still rages, or highlight what key factor(s) brought about the peace. (4 pages: 20%) AFST REGISTRANTS MUST USE AN AFRICAN CASE
- Short essay on methods of conflict transformation (Unit 3): compare and contrast two approaches to conflict transformation, building positive peace, or religious frameworks for peace from the last unit. Weigh the pros and cons of each approach. (3 pages: 15%)
- Final Exam (Short answer format) (20%). Friday December 14, 1:30-3:30 p.m. NO MAKE-UPS ALLOWED.
- Attendance: I will take attendance daily. You are allowed four (4) unexcused absences. After that, you will lose points for failing to attend class without a
