JS/HIS 216 MODERN JEWISH HISTORY

Course Description and Goals

What does it mean to be a Jew in the modern world? The vexed question of Jewish identity emerged at the end of the eighteenth century in Europe and has dominated Jewish history throughout the modern period. This course will introduce students to the major social, cultural, religious, and political transformations that shaped the lives of World Jewry from the 17th century until the present. We will explore such topics as the nature of traditional Jewish society, emancipation, Jewish diversity, the reform of Judaism, competing political ideologies, Jewish-gentile relations, the rise of modern anti-Semitism, the role of Jewish women, interwar Jewish life and culture, Jewish responses to Nazism and the Holocaust, the creation of the state of Israel, and the situation of Jews in the postwar period.

This course has three main goals:

- to introduce students to the diversity of Jewish politics, culture, and society in the modern period;
- to understand and engage historians' interpretations of the meaning of Jewish history from 1650 to the present;
- to sharpen your skills at reading, writing, discussing, and analyzing.
