Religious Studies 208: Introduction to Western Religions

DESCRIPTION

This is a basic introduction to the three great monotheistic religions of the Western World: Christinaity, Judaism and Islam. The course presupposes no previous knowldege on your part of these religions, nor does it presuppose that you have any previous background in the academic study of religion.

The course will be conducted as a comparative study of the three Western religions, in which we will discuss and compare the origins, history, theology and modernization process undergone by each. The course will also include a look at the current conflicts within and among these traditions in Europe and the Middle East. Some class time will be devoted to reading original texts of each religion so that you can see how each tradition describes itself in its own words. Reading assignments for each day are meant to give you the background you will need to understand the texts and class discussion. It is important that you keep up with the readings because class discussion will assume you know the basic themes and vocabulary for the days discussion.
