## JDST/RLGN 350/450 Jewish Ethics

This course will be conducted as an advanced seminar. The material to be covered all relates to issues of life-and-death. Students will be encouraged not only to engage intellectually which each topic as it is discussed in class, but to build on previous material so as to establish in their own minds the interconnections among topics. By the end of the semester, the students should be able to identify and articulate common assumptions and positions that cut across the specific topics. Students should also be able to identify trends in approach that align with various "movements" in modern Judaism – Hasidic, Orthodox, Liberal, secular, etc.

In general, Monday will be spent looking at and analyzing the primary texts on which the rabbinic and modern positions rest. This will include the most commonly cited periscopes from Tanakh, Mishnah, Gemara, the Mishneh Torah and the Shulkhan Aruch, as appropriate. Wednesday will be devoted to an analysis, discussion and critique of the assigned reading and how the reading uses the primary source in the light of the author's historical situation.

Because this is an advanced seminar setting, students are expected to do the assigned readings before class and to come prepared to discuss them. Grades will be based on class attendance and participation in seminar discussions/ (50%) and on the final "responsum" that each student will write which will be based on a question which draws widely on the material covered. (50%).
